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

Major coup plot against Captain Ibrahim Traoré thwarted in Burkina Faso



President Ibrahim Traoré of Burkina **Faso**

Burkina Faso's military-led government announced on April 22 that it had successfully thwarted a major coup plot targeting junta leader, Captain Ibrahim Traoré. According to Security Minister Mahamadou Sana, the conspiracy involved active and retired soldiers allegedly collaborating with terrorist groups to storm the presidential palace.

The plot, reportedly set for April 16, aimed to destabilise the country, install a regime under the control of an international

organisation, and incite rebellion by manipulating religious and traditional leaders to sway military officers.

Sana revealed that the masterminds of the operation were believed to be operating from Ivory Coast, though Ivorian authorities have yet to respond to the allegations.

The announcement followed the arrest of several military personnel, including two officers, suspected of involvement in the plot. Sana claimed that the

conspirators had been recruiting soldiers and passing strategic information to terrorist elements to fuel unrest.

This is not the first time Captain Traoré's administration has reported attempted coups. Traoré, who seized power in 2022 amid frustration over jihadist violence, continues to face challenges in maintaining control, with nearly 40% of Burkina Faso outside government authority due to insurgent activities.







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

Jackson H. Angaine

Jackson H. Angaine was born in 1903 under the name of Jackson Harvester M'Nchebere. "Angaine" was his father's name, Chief M'Angaine MBE, a colonial paramount chief and prominent leader of the Njuri Ncheke, council of elders and so-called traditional government in Meru.

Jackson's grand-father was believed to have been a traditional Meru prophet, a Mugwe, who had foreseen the insidious conflicts in Meru brought about by the struggle of independence.

Growing up in the colony, Jackson Angaine was educated at the Alliance High School, like many of his fellow politicians (Kipkorir, 1969; Charton, 2002). After working as an accountant for some

Njuri Ncheke was one of the main defenders of the integrity of the Meru land unit, which they saw as a necessary condition to maintain the cohesion of the Meru tribe against foreign intrusions, in particular that of the Kikuyu. Land shortage in Central province (the White highlands) forced many landless Kikuyu to settle in Meru, while colonial authorities were at pains to relocate them.

Meru district appeared to become an ideal place, not only because land was available, but also because of the alleged similarities of Meru and Kikuyu tribal practices (Parsons, 2012). *In the late 1940s, tribal* integrity was a prominent concern among Meru chiefs and elders, who felt threatened by the migrations and the subsequent institutional disruptions these might cause in the district.

years, Angaine started being politically active: he was secretary for the Meru Local Native Council (1935-1948), then became chairman of the KAU local branch (1948-1952), where he also worked with Jomo Kenyatta. His involthe Mau Mau movement that rose at that time was always ambiguous. In 1954, when the Emergency was declared, Angaine was arrested and shortly detained by the colonial government. It remains unclear, however, whether this was primarily because he was suspected of being a Mau Mau, or because he was accused of, and prosecuted for the murder of his wife. His judgement proved inconclusive, and he was acquitted for lack of any proof.

Nevertheless, his detention contributed to establish him as a follower of the movement. His links to both Njuri Ncheke and the Mau Mau would prove very useful to boost his political career upon independence. In 1960, Angaine joined KANU (Maxon and Ofcansky, 2014). From tactful subversion to "pro-government of late": Angaine's strategic politicking in Meru (1960-1962)

The political situation in Meru was particularly worrisome at that time, mostly because of Mau Mau resilience: the district was the last bastion of influential Mau Mau leaders who refused to surrender to the government, and took over the command of the Kenya Land Freedom Army (Kamunchuluh, 1975: 208; Kanogo, 1987; Kinyatti, 2008). Their resistance risked, in the government's view, encouraging the remaining freedom fighters and released detainees to form a separated community and challenge the government's authority.

Local politics were further complicated by the KANU- KADU competition in the district. Colonial administrators, fearing a revival of Mau Mau activities, suspected them all of "double talk" politics, publicly denouncing terrorist oathing, yet spreading oaths to "ensure support for their party."

Jackson Angaine, then KANU chairman for Meru, was held responsible for such practices by the colonial authorities: "he is the source of all subversion, and indeed started the oathing campaign in the 1960 in order to defeat [KADU leader Bernard] Mate's influence."

He was suspected of having a close contact with radical KANU leaders as well as with so-called ex-terrorists.

Angaine systematically denied any sub-



versive activity, or any populist use of oathing campaigns.

This did not end the suspicions. In May 1962, the Central Province Commissioner felt bound to ask Jomo Kenyatta to "do everything he could to convince Angaine" to stop his "tactics".

The situation did not improve, and finally reached the Governor's office. The Governor himself requested Kenyatta, then president of KANU, to take urgent action to discipline the politician, quoting Kenyatta's earlier "special plea (...) to overlook Mr. Angaine's actions" and recalling that "it was yourself who said to me (...) that it was necessary to have discipline in the Government".

Kenyatta must have felt politically cornered in Angaine's case. He did not seem to have much esteem for the latter, as colonial administrators claimed that he was "more prepared to sack him" than anyone else. He nonetheless avoided any personal interference with Angaine, leaving the sensitive task to ensure his resignation from his KANU seat in the Legislative Council to the Governor.

Angaine did not resign, but finally "showed signs of being strongly pro-government", a change colonial officers perceived to be of personal interest. Then a strong defender of the KANU party-line, Angaine found himself in opposition not only to KADU leaders in Meru, such as the educated Bernard Mate, but also with the Njuri Ncheke, the traditional government. At the heart

of the competition between Angaine and Njuri Ncheke was the control of the Meru vote, as well as the control over land transactions in the district. Njuri Ncheke was a powerful institution as, in 1955, the colonial government strengthened it to ensure the Mau Mau movement would not gain ground in Meru district. Njuri Ncheke was "recognised officially by combining it with the Local Government system of the District." The traditional council nominated all civil servants.

Reinforcing the authority of Njuri Ncheke over administrative business enhanced their control over land ownership in Meru. As colonial officers noted, Njuri Ncheke held records of land transactions and "any decision which affected the laws and customs of the tribe had to be discussed by them before any adjustment could be made."

This was a useful device to counter emerging Mau Mau claims. Already in 1950, the Njuri Ncheke elders decided that "any Meru who took an illegal oath would be dispossessed of all tribal rights and land". Njuri Ncheke would continue to oppose the Mau Mau throughout the decade, either by organizing ceremonies to curse the movement or, later, by organizing the rehabilitation of Mau Mau detainees in camps.













Judge blocks Trump push to cut funding to public schools over diversity programs.

Two major law firms asked separate judges Wednesday to permanently block President Donald Trump's executive orders that were meant to punish them and harm their business operations.

The firms — Perkins Coie and WilmerHale — say the orders are unconstitutional assaults on the legal profession threaten their relationships with clients and retaliate against them based on their past legal representations or their association with particular attorneys whom Trump perceives as his adversaries.

Courts last month temporarily halted enforcement of key provisions of both orders, but the firms asked in court Wednesday for the edicts to be struck down in their entirety and for judges to issue rulings in their favor. Another firm, Jenner & Block, is scheduled to make similar arguments next week and a fourth, Susman Godfrey, is set to make its case next month.

District Judge Beryl Howell did not immediately rule on the deep unease over the executive order, signaling that she was inclined to side with Perkins Coie.

She grilled a Justice Department lawyer over the government's plans to suspend the security clearances of lawyers at the firm and asked him to-respond to the suggestion that the blacklisting of disfavored law firms

A federal judge on Thursday blocked Trump administration directives that threatened to cut federal funding for public schools with diversity, equity and inclusion programs.

The ruling came in a lawsuit brought by the National Education Association and the American Civil Liberties Union, which accused the Republican administration of giving "unconstitutionally vague" guidance and violating teachers' First Amendment rights.

A second judge on Thursday postponed the effective date of some U.S.

Education Department anti-DEI guidance, ruling in a separate case filed by the American Federation of Teachers in Maryland.

In February, the department told schools and colleges they needed to end any practice that differentiates people based on their race. Earlier this month, it ordered states to gather signatures from local school systems certifying compliance with civil rights laws, including the rejection of what the federal government calls "illegal DEI practices."

The directives do not carry the force of law but threaten

to use civil rights enforcement to rid schools of DEI practices. Schools were warned that continuing such practices "in violation of federal law" could lead to U.S. Justice Department litigation and a termination of federal grants and contracts.

U.S. District Court Judge Landya McCafferty in New Hampshire said the April letter does not make clear what the department believes a DEI program entails or when it believes such programs cross the line into violating civil rights law. "The Letter does not even define what a 'DEI program' is," McCafferty wrote.

The judge also said there is reason to believe the department's actions amount to a violation of teachers' free speech rights.

"A professor runs afoul of the 2025 Letter if she expresses the view in her teaching that structural racism exists in America, but does not do so if she denies structural racism's existence. That is textbook viewpoint discrimination," McCafferty wrote.

In rare rebuke of Putin, Trump urges Russia to 'STOP!' after deadly attack on Kyiv



WASHINGTON- President Donald Trump on Thursday offered rare criticism of Vladimir Putin, urging the Russian leader to "STOP!" after a deadly barrage of attacks on Kyiv, Ukraine's capital.

"I am not happy with the Russian strikes on KYIV. Not necessary, and very bad timing. Vladimir, STOP! 5000 soldiers a week are dying." Trump said in a post on his Truth Social platform. "Lets get the Peace Deal DONE!"

Russia struck Kyiv with an hourslong barrage of missiles and drones. At least 12 people were killed and 90 were injured in the deadliest assault on the city since last July.

Trump's frustration is growing as a U.S.-led effort to get a peace agreement between Ukraine and Russia has not made progress.

The comments about Putin came after Trump lashed out at Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy on Wednesday and accused him of prolonging the "killing field" by refusing to surrender the Russia-occupied Crimean Peninsula as part of a possible deal. Russia illegally annexed that area in 2014.

USA- A major meeting in London aimed at bringing about an end to Russia's war in Ukraine has been downgraded after US Secretary of State Marco Rubio said he would skip the summit, escalating a clash between Washington and Kyiv over the future of Russian-occupied territory.

Rubio had been expected to take part in the discussions with Ukrainian, UK and European officials, but State Department spokesperson Tammy Bruce said Tuesday that he would no longer attend due to "logistical issues."

London's Foreign Office then confirmed on Wednesday that the meeting would take place at a lower level. "Official level talks will continue but these are closed to media," the department said in a message to journalists.

The developments throw new uncer-

tainty over the diplomatic efforts to end Russia's war. The United States has become increasingly steadfast in its push to force Kyiv to an agreement, but Ukraine is adamant that it will not give up Crimea, which has been occupied by Russia since 2014, or parts of eastern Ukraine that were captured following Moscow's full-scale invasion in 2022. US Vice President JD Vance threatened to abandon negotiations on Wednesday, telling reporters during a visit to India: "We've issued a very explicit proposal to both the Russians and Ukrainians, and it's time for them to either say yes or for the US to walk away from this process. We've engaged in an extraordinary amount of diplomacy, of on the ground work."

But Ukraine's European allies, particularly Britain and France, have been hoping to bridge the divide. Wednesday's talks were due to follow a meeting



in Paris last week in which officials from the US, the United Kingdom, France and Germany discussed the American framework for a ceasefire.

After Rubio reversed plans to attend the latest talks, Bruce said President Donald Trump's special envoy for Ukraine and Russia, Keith Kellogg, would represent the US in London instead.

The US proposal that has caused deadlock includes recognizing Russia's control of Crimea, the southern Ukrainian peninsula illegally annexed by Moscow, an official familiar with the framework told CNN. It would also put a ceasefire in place along the front lines of the war, the official said.

Any move to recognize Russia's cont-

of US policy.

Ukraine's President Volodymyr Zelensky made clear Tuesday that he was open to talks with Russia, but that Kyiv would not accept a deal that recognizes Moscow's control of Crimea. "Ukraine will not legally recognize" the occupation of Crimea," he told reporters. "There is nothing to talk about. It is against our constitution." Asked to clarify about whether he meant the US wanted to freeze the territorial lines where they are, Vance said Wednesday, "No, I didn't say that. What I said is the current line, somewhere close to them is where you're ultimately, I think, going to draw the new lines in the conflict. Now of course, that means the Ukrainians

and the Russians are both going to have to give up some of the territory they currently own. There's gonna have to be some territorial swaps." Meanwhile, the war has resumed with full force this week, following a surprise ceasefire over the Easter weekend that both sides accused each other of breaching.

On Wednesday, Ukrainian authorities said nine people were killed and at least 30 wounded when a Russian drone struck a bus carrying people to work near the city of Marhanets in the Dnipropetrovsk region.

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

Historian Susan Pedersen describes Bunche as the "architect" of the United Nations' trusteeship regime. Bunche was a principal author of the chapters in the UN charter on non-self-determining territories and trusteeship. He was later head of the Trusteeship Division of the UN.

BLACK HISTORY- Ralph Johnson Bunche BUNCH; August 7, 1904 -December 9, 1971) was an American political scientist, diplomat, and leading actor in the mid-20th-century decolonization process and US civil rights movement, who received the 1950 Nobel Peace Prize for his late 1940s mediation in Palestine. He is the first black Nobel laureate and the first person of African descent to be awarded a Nobel Prize. He was involved in the formation and early administration of the United Nations (UN), and played a major role in both the decolonization process and numerous UN peacekeeping operations.

Bunche served on the US delegation to both the Dumbarton Oaks Conference in 1944 and United Nations Conference on International Organization in 1945 that drafted the UN charter. He then served on the American delegation to the first session of the United Nations General Assembly in 1946 and joined the UN as head of the Trusteeship Department, beginning a long series of troubleshooting roles and responsibilities related to decolonization. In 1948, Bunche became an acting mediator for the Middle East, negotiating an armistice between Egypt and Israel. For this success he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1950.

Bunche continued to serve at the UN, working on crises in the Sinai (1956), the Congo (1960), Yemen (1963), Cyprus (1964) and Bahrain in 1970, reporting directly to the UN Secretary-General. He chaired study groups dealing with water resources in the Middle East. In 1957, he was promoted to Under-Secretary-General for special political affairs, having prime responsibility for peacekeeping roles. In 1965, Bunche supervised the cease-fire following the war between India and Pakistan. He retired from the UN in June 1971, dying six months later.

In 1963, he was awarded the Presidential

Medal of Freedom by President John F. Kennedy. At the UN, Bunche gained such fame that Ebony magazine proclaimed him perhaps the most influential African American of the first half of the 20th century and "or nearly a decade, he was the most celebrated African American of his time both [in the US] and abroad."


Early life and education

Bunche was born in Detroit, Michigan, in 1904 and baptized at the city's Second Baptist Church. When Ralph was a child, his family moved to Toledo, Ohio, where his father looked for work. They returned to Detroit in 1909 after his sister Grace was born, with the help of their maternal aunt, Ethel Johnson. Their father did not live with the family again after Ohio and had not been "a good provider". But he followed them when they moved to New Mexico.

Because of the declining health of his mother and uncle, the family moved to Albuquerque, New Mexico, in 1915. His mother, "a musically inclined woman who contributed much to what her son called a household 'bubbling over with ideas and opinions", died in 1917 from tuberculosis, and his uncle shortly thereafter. Thereafter, Bunche was raised by his maternal grandmother, Lucy Taylor Johnson, whom he credited with instilling in him his pride in his race and his self-belief.

In 1918, Lucy Taylor Johnson moved with the two Bunche grandchildren to the South Central neighborhood of Los An-

Bunche was a brilliant student, a debater, athlete and the valedictorian of his graduating class at Jefferson High School. He attended the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) as a political science student, and graduated summa cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa in 1927 as the valedictorian of his class. Using



the money his community raised for his studies and a graduate scholarship at Harvard University, he earned a doctorate in political science.

Academic career

Bunche earned a master's degree in political science in 1928 and a doctorate in 1934, while he was already teaching in the Department of Political Science at Howard University, a historically black college. At the time, it was typical for doctoral candidates to start teaching before completion of their dissertations. He was the first African American to gain a PhD in political science from an American university. Bunche's 1934 dissertation, "French Administration in Togoland and Dahomey", won the Toppan Prize for the best dissertation on comparative politics in the Department of Government at Harvard University. The dissertation examined the mandates system of the League of Nations, arguing that the system was indistinguishable from formal empire.

From 1936 to 1938, Ralph Bunche studied anthropology and conducted postdoctoral research at Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, and at the London School of Economics (LSE), and later at the University of Cape Town in South Africa.

He published his first book, A World View of Race, in 1936, arguing that "race is a social concept which can be and is employed effectively to rouse and rationalize emotions an admirable device for the cultivation of group prejudices." In 1940, Bunche served as the chief research associate to Swedish sociologist Gunnar Myrdal's landmark study of racial dynamics in the U.S., An American Dilemma: The Negro Problem and Modern Democracy.

For more than two decades (1928–1950), Bunche served as chair of the Department of Political Science at Howard University, where he also taught. Furthermore, he contributed to the Howard School of International Relations with his work regarding the effect racism and imperialism had on global economic systems and international relations.

Bunche was elected to the American Philosophical Society in 1950. He was the first Black member to be inducted into the Society since its founding in 1743. In 1953–54, he served as the president of the American Political Science Association. He served as a member of the Board of Overseers of his alma mater, Harvard University (1960–1965), as a member of the board of the Institute of International Education, and as a trustee of Oberlin College, Lincoln University, and New

Lincoln School. World War II years

In 1941-43, Bunche worked in the Research and Analysis Branch (R&A) of the Office of Strategic Services (OSS), the wartime intelligence service, as a senior social analyst on Colonial Affairs. In 1943, he was transferred from the



OSS to the State Department. He was appointed Associate Chief of the Division of Dependent Area Affairs under Alger Hiss. With Hiss, Bunche became one of the leaders of the Institute of Pacific Relations (IPR). He participated in the preliminary planning for the United Nations at the San Francisco Conference of 1945. In 2008, the U.S. National Archives and Records Administration released a 51-page PDF of his OSS records, which is available online.

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
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Succession, Legacy and the Future of Kenyan Evangelical Churches.


I have reflected on the lives of four towering figures in Kenya's church history - Dr Jesse Kamau, Maurice Otunga, Manasses Kuria and Stephen Birech. These four men led the PCEA, Catholic, Anglican and AIC churches in Kenya and retired honourably to await their return to the One in whose name they had preached the gospel. They wisely avoided the seductive accumulation of riches and at no point did any of them appear on TV asking for offerings in exchange for miracles. Of the four, only Rev. Dr Jesse Kamau remains, vibrantly full of life and faith.

Their lives and witness presents sobering lessons that owners of today's evangelical churches in Kenya and the diaspora may learn from. I have watched in agonising despair on the media Kenyan church owners bragging about owning hundreds of churches. churches they well know will disintegrate were they to die. Most of these churches do not have succession planning and institutional structures to outlive their owners. Indeed, Apostle Nganga described them as kiosks.

Yes, profit seeking physical shells beholden to the life of their founder. This springs the excruciating question of legacy that church owners need to confront, prickly as that may be. Where will their congregation be without them? If your congregation's fidelity is tethered to your individual persona and charisma rather than to God, it perhaps fits closely with the description of a cult rather than a church. What then can church owners do to secure a lasting legacy and leave behind thriving and lasting ministries? First they need to subordinate their egos, titles and greed to the fidelity of their calling. Longevity of leadership isn't equal to legacy.

The ministry of Jesus Christ lasted only 3 years. Indeed, little is known about where Jesus Christ was or was doing between the ages of 12 and 30. He barely travelled more than a 50 kilometre radius during his ministry. But he had foot soldiers called Apostles. As a church owner are you willingly nurturing younger pastors and deacons or are you fixated with being the senior overseer or bishop? If so, your legacy is on very shaky sand.

Secondly, establish a clear structure with a strong church leadership made up not of weak clones handpicked by you, but of competent individuals with a combined integrity, intellect and experience multiple times greater than you as the lead pastor, bishop or general overseer.



Surrounding yourself with halleluiah empty heads is sowing the seeds of your eventual destruction and demise.

A strong leadership needs to be able to stand up to the senior pastor or bishop however strong and offer correction, counsel and restraint for the good of the church, rather than the leader. Unrestrained power ultimately consumes the bearer. Third and finally, every church leader needs to embrace lifelog learning geared towards acquiring lifelong skills useful beyond the pulpit.

Rowan Williams, a former primate of the Anglican Church, retired honourably and took a teaching position at the University of Cambridge, continuing to

contribute to theology beyond the pulpit, untethered by greed for riches and material possessions. Greatness cannot be bought by money. Jimmy Carter who served as US president returned to his church after the presidency and served as an unpaid lay minister and Sunday school teacher in his 70/80s.

His greatest achievements for which he won the Nobel Peace Award were not as president but retired president. The price of greatness is humility, not ego. Reverend Dr Jesse Kamau remains a respected and highly sought after father figure, over 20 years after retiring as head of the Presbyterian church in Kenya. Catholic churches in the late 1990s would burst

to the seams with congregants every time Cardinal Otunga appeared after retirement; humble to the ground and reminding those in attendance that he was above all a simple ordinary priest. He understood his calling and purpose and declined the seductive trap of riches and money that has ruthlessly poisoned and risks destroying the evangelical churches.

To that Bishop, Overseer or Prophet leading a church he/she owns and controls, it is not late to start thinking about a future beyond you; to understand that true greatness resides in nurturing and raising others to become better generals than yourself; including in your absence. Without the Apostles, particularly the Apostle Paul, an outsider to the original ministry of Jesus Christ, there would perhaps not be Christianity as we know it today.

Yes, because it was the Apostle Paul who became the Apostle to the Gentiles; of whom today's Bishops and Overseers derive the grand titles that have blinded some of them to elevate the altar of tithes, offerings and riches above the enduring service to God and His Humanity. No legacy, lasting peace and honour is available to those unable to see a life and future beyond their bulging egos and exulted self-importance.

"For one's own temporary selfish interests, sacrificing the interests of others in exchange for so-called exemptions is like seeking the skin from a tiger. It will ultimately only fail on both ends and harm others without benefiting themselves."

Translation: "f- around and find out."

Not to be outdone, China is racing to counter the U.S. pressure campaign. President Xi Jinping recently wrapped up his first foreign trip of the year, visiting Vietnam, Malaysia, and Cambodia, where he inked a string of bilateral agreements

and pledged support for free

Chinese officials have also been actively engaging with Japan, South Korea, and the EU in an effort to reinforce regional ties and establish a sort of "hey, we're all mad at America, right?" type of agreement.

JESUS OF VAZARETH

Ancient Jews usually had only one name, and, when greater specificity was needed, it was customary to add the father's name or the place of origin. Thus, in

his lifetime Jesus was called Jesus son of Joseph (Luke 4:22; John 1:45, 6:42), Jesus of Nazareth (Acts 10:38), or Jesus the Nazarene (Mark 1:24; Luke 24:19).

Jesus (c. 6 to 4 BC - AD 30 or 33), also referred to as Jesus Christ, Jesus of Nazareth, and many other names and titles, was a 1st-century Jewish preacher and religious leader. He is the central figure of Christianity, the world's largest religion. Most Christian denominations believe Jesus to be the incarnation of God the Son and the awaited messiah, or Christ, a descendant from the Davidic line that is prophesied in the Old Testament. Virtually all modern scholars of antiquity agree that Jesus existed

historically.

Accounts of Jesus's life are contained in the Gospels, especially the four canonical Gospels in the New Testament. Academic research has yielded various views on the historical reliability of the Gospels and how closely they reflect the historical Jesus.

Jesus was circumcised at eight days old, was baptized by John the Baptist as a young adult, and after 40 days and nights of fasting in the wilderness, began his own ministry. He was an itinerant teacher who interpreted

the law of God with divine authority and was often referred to as "rabbi".


Jesus often debated with his fellow Jews on how to best follow God, engaged in healings, taught in parables, and gathered followers, among whom twelve were appointed as his chosen apostles. He was arrested in Jerusalem and tried by the Jewish authorities.

He was turned over to the Roman government, and crucified on the order of Pontius Pilate, the Roman prefect of Judaea. After his death, his followers

became convinced that he rose from the dead, and following his ascension, the community they formed eventually became the early Christian Church that expanded as a worldwide movement.

It is hypothesized that accounts of his teachings and life were initially conserved by oral transmission, which was the source of the written Gospels.








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Marcus Mosiah Garvey Jr.

Marcus Mosiah Garvey was born on 17 August 1887 in Saint Ann's Bay, a town in the British colony of Jamaica. In the context of colonial Jamaican society, which had a colourist social hierarchy, Garvey was considered at the lowest end, being a black child who was of full African descent.

Garvey was a controversial figure. Some in the African diasporic community regarded him as a pretentious demagogue, and were highly critical of his collaboration with white supremacists, his violent rhetoric, and his prejudice against mixed-race people and Jews.

HISTORY- Marcus Mosiah Garvey Jr.was a Jamaican political activist. He was the founder and first President-General of the Universal Negro Improvement Association and African Communities League (UNIA-ACL) (commonly known as UNIA), through which he declared himself Provisional President of Africa. Garvey was ideologically a black nationalist and Pan-Africanist. His ideas came to be known as Garveyism.

Garvey was born into a moderately prosperous Afro-Jamaican family in Saint Ann's Bay and was apprenticed into the print trade as a teenager. Working in Kingston, he became involved in trade unionism. He later lived briefly in Costa Rica, Panama, and England. On returning to Jamaica, he founded the UNIA in 1914. In 1916, he moved to the United States and established a UNIA branch in New York City's Harlem district. Emphasising unity between Africans and the African diaspora, he campaigned for an end to European colonial rule in Africa and advocated the political unification of the continent. He envisioned a unified Africa as a one-party state, governed by himself, that would enact laws to ensure black racial purity. Although he never visited the continent, he was committed to the Back-to-Africa movement, arguing that part of the diaspora should migrate there. Garveyist ideas became increasingly popular, and the UNIA grew in membership. His black separatist views—and his relationship with white racists like the Ku Klux Klan (KKK) in the interest of advancing their shared goal of racial separatism—caused a division between Garvey and other prominent African-American civil rights activists such as W. E. B. Du Bois, who promoted racial integration.

Believing that black people needed to be financially independent from white-dominated societies, Garvey launched various businesses in the U.S., including the Negro Factories Corporation and Negro World newspaper. In 1919, he became President of the Black Star Line shipping and passenger company, designed to forge a link between North America and Africa and facilitate African-American migration to Liberia. In 1923 Garvey was convicted of mail fraud for selling the company's stock, and was imprisoned in the United States Penitentiary, Atlanta for nearly two years. Garvey blamed Jews and Catholics, claiming that they were prejudiced against him because of his links to the KKK. His sentence was commuted by U.S. president Calvin Coolidge and he was deported to Jamaica in 1927. Settling in Kingston with his wife Amy Jacques, Garvey established the People's Political Party in 1929, briefly serving as a city councillor. With the UNIA in increasing financial difficulty, he relocated to London in 1935, where his anti-socialist stance distanced him from many of the city's black activists. He died there in 1940, and in 1964 his body was returned to Jamaica for reburial in Kingston's National Heroes Park.

Garvey was a controversial figure. Some in the African diasporic community regarded him as a pretentious demagogue, and were highly critical of his collaboration with white supremacists, his violent rhetoric, and his prejudice against mixedrace people and Jews. He received praise for encouraging a sense of pride and selfworth among Africans and the African diaspora amid widespread poverty, discrimination and colonialism. In Jamaica, he is recognized as a national hero, the first person to be recognized as such. His ideas exerted a considerable influence on such movements as Rastafari, the Nation of Islam and the Black Power Movement.

In the context of colonial Jamaican society, which had a colourist social hierarchy, Garvey was considered at the lowest end, being a black child who was of full African descent. However, later genetic research nevertheless revealed that he had ancestors from the Iberian Peninsula. Garvey's paternal greatgrandfather had been born into slavery prior to its abolition in Jamaica. His surname, which was of Irish origin, had been inherited from his family's former enslavers.

His father, Malchus Garvey, was a stonemason; his mother, Sarah Richards, was a domestic servant and the daughter of peasant farmers. Malchus had had two previous wives before Sarah, having six children between them. Sarah bore him four additional children, of whom Marcus was the youngest, although two died in infancy. Because of his profession, Malchus' family were wealthier than many of their peasant neighbours; they were petite bourgeoise. Malchus was however reckless with his money and over the



course of his life lost most of the land he owned to meet payments. Malchus had a book collection and was self-educated; he also served as a deacon at a local Wesleyan church. Malchus was an intolerant and punitive father and husband; he never had a close relationship with his son.

Up to the age of 14, Garvey attended a local church school; further education was unaffordable for the family.
When not in school, Garvey worked on his maternal uncle's tenant farm.
He had friends, with whom he once


broke the windows of a church, resulting in his arrest. Some of his friends were white, although he found that as they grew older they distanced themselves from him; he later recalled that a close childhood friend was a white girl: "We were two innocent fools who never dreamed of a race feeling and problem." In 1901, Marcus was apprenticed to his godfather, a local printer. In 1904, the printer opened another branch at Port Maria, where Garvey began to work, travelling from Saint Ann's Bay each morning.

In 1905 he moved to Kingston, where he boarded in Smith Village, a working-class neighbourhood. In the city, he secured work with the printing division of the P.A. Benjamin Manufacturing Company. He rose quickly through the company ranks, becoming their first Afro-Jamaican foreman. His sister and mother, by this point estranged from his father, moved to join him in the city. In January 1907, Kingston was hit by an earthquake that reduced much of the city to rubble. He, his mother, and his sister were left to sleep in the open for several months.In March 1908, his mother died. While in Kingston, Garvey converted to Catholicism.

Garvey became a trade unionist, vice president of the compositors' section of the Printers' Union, and took a leading role in the November 1908 print workers' strike. The strike was broken several weeks later and Garvey was sacked. Henceforth branded a troublemaker, Garvey was unable to find work in the private sector. He then found temporary employment with a government printer. As a result of these experiences, Garvey became increasingly angry at the inequalities present in Jamaican society.

Acne is a skin condition that occurs when your hair follicles become plugged with oil and dead skin cells. It causes whiteheads, blackheads or pimples. Acne is most common among teenagers, though it affects people of all ages.

Effective acne treatments are available, but acne can be persistent. The pimples and bumps heal slowly, and when one begins to go away, others seem to crop up.

Depending on its severity, acne can cause emotional distress and scar the skin. The earlier you start treatment, the lower your risk of such problems.

Acne signs vary depending on the severity of your condition:

Whiteheads (closed plugged pores)


Blackheads (open plugged pores)

Acne usually appears on the face, forehead, chest, upper back and shoulders.

If self-care remedies don't clear your acne, see your primary care doctor. He or she can prescribe stronger medications. If acne persists or is severe, you may want to seek medical treatment from a doctor who specializes in the skin (dermatologist or pediatric dermatologist).

For many women, acne can persist for decades, with flares common a week before menstrua-

tion. This type of acne tends to clear up without treatment in women who use contraceptives.

In older adults, a sudden onset of severe acne may signal an underlying disease requiring medical attention.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) warns that some popular nonprescription acne lotions, cleansers and other skin products can cause a serious reaction. This type of reaction is quite rare, so don't confuse it with any redness, irritation or itchiness that occurs in

areas where you've applied medications or products.

Cosme-Cosmetics. tics don't necessarily worsen acne, especially if you use oil-free makeup that doesn't clog pores (noncomedogenics) and remove makeup regularly. Nonoily cosmetics don't interfere with the effectiveness of acne drugs.


Acne typically appears on your face, forehead, chest, upper back and shoulders because these areas of skin have the most oil (sebaceous) glands. Hair follicles are connected to oil glands.

The follicle wall may bulge and produce a whitehead. Or the plug may be open to the surface and darken, causing a blackhead. A blackhead may look like dirt stuck in pores. But actually the pore is congested with bacteria and oil, which turns brown when it's exposed to the air.

Pimples are raised red spots with a white center that develop when blocked hair follicles become inflamed or infected with bacteria. **Blockages and inflammation** deep inside hair follicles produce cystlike lumps beneath the surface of your skin. Other pores in your skin, which are the openings of the sweat glands, aren't usually involved in acne.

Diet. Studies indicate that consuming certain foods — including carbohydrate-rich foods, such as bread, bagels and chips — may worsen acne. Further study is needed to examine whether people with acne would benefit from following specific dietary restrictions.





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
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Countee LeRoy Porter

Cullen was brought to Harlem at the age of nine by Amanda Porter, believed to be his paternal grandmother, who cared for him until her death in 1917.

USA- Countee LeRoy Porter was born on May 30, 1903, to Elizabeth Thomas Lucas. Due to a lack of records of his early childhood, historians have had difficulty identifying his birthplace. Baltimore, Maryland, New York City, and Louisville, Kentucky have been cited as possibilities. Although Cullen claimed to have been born in New York City, he also frequently referred to Louisville, Kentucky, as his birthplace on legal applications. Cullen was brought to Harlem at the age of nine by Amanda Porter, believed to be his paternal grandmother, who cared for him until her death in 1917.

Reverend Frederick A. Cullen, pastor of Salem Methodist Episcopal Church, Harlem's largest congregation, and his wife, the former Carolyn Belle Mitchell, adopted the 15-year-old Countee Porter, although the adoption may not have been official.

Frederick Cullen was a central figure in Countee's life, and acted as his father. The influential minister eventually became president of the Harlem chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

DeWitt Clinton High School

Cullen entered the DeWitt Clinton High School, then located in Hell's Kitchen.[5] He excelled academically at the school and started writing poetry. He won a citywide poetry contest.

At DeWitt, he was elected into the honor society, was editor of the weekly newspaper, and was elected vice-president of his graduating class.[5] In January 1922, he graduated with honors in Latin, Greek, Mathematics, and French

After graduating from high school, he attended New York University (NYU). In 1923, at the Town Hall in New York City, he gave a speech to the League of Youth in which he said, "For we must be one thing or the other, an asset or a liability, the sinew in your wing to help you soar, or the chain to bind you to earth." The speech was later printed in The Crisis (August 1923). Also in 1923, Cullen won second prize in the Witter Bynner National Competitions for Undergraduate Poetry, sponsored

by the Poetry Society of America, for his book of poems titled, "The Ballad of the Brown Girl". Soon after, he was publishing poetry in national periodicals such as Harper's, The Crisis, Opportunity, The Bookman, and Poetry, earning him a national reputation. The ensuing year, he again placed second in the contest, finally winning first prize in 1925. He competed in a poetry contest sponsored by Opportunity and came in second with "To One Who Say Me Nay", losing to Langston Hughes's "The Weary Blues". Cullen graduated from NYU in 1925 and was one of eleven students selected to Phi Beta Kappa.

That same year, Cullen entered Harvard to pursue a master's in English, and published Color, his first collection of poems that later became a landmark of the Harlem Renaissance. Written in a careful, traditional style, the work celebrated black beauty and deplored the effects of racism. The volume included "Heritage" and "Incident", probably his most famous poems. "Yet Do I Marvel", about racial identity and injustice, showed the literary influence of William Wordsworth and William Blake, but its subject was far from the world of their Romantic sonnets.

The poet accepts that there is God, and "God is good, well-meaning, kind", but he finds a contradiction in his own plight in a racist society: he is black and a poet. In 1926, Cullen graduated with a master's degree while also serving as the guest editor of a special "Negro Poets" issue of the poetry magazine, Palms. The appointment led to Harper's inviting him to edit an anthology of Black poetry in 1927.


American writer Alain Locke helped Cullen come to terms with his sexuality. Locke wanted to introduce a new generation of African-American writers, such as Countee Cullen, to the reading public. Locke also sought to present the authentic natures of sex and sexuality through writing, creating a kind of relationship with those who felt the same.

Locke introduced Cullen to gay-affirming material, such as the work of Edward Carpenter, at a time when most gays were in the closet. In March 1923, Cullen wrote to Locke about Carpenter's work: "It opened up for me soul windows which had been closed; it threw a noble and evident light on what I had begun to believe, because of what the world believes, ignoble and unnatural".

Critics and historians have not

reached consensus as to Cullen's sexuality, partly because Cullen was unsure of this himself. Cullen's first marriage, to Yolande Du Bois, experienced difficulties before ending in divorce.

He subsequently had relationships with many different men, although each ended poorly. Each relationship had a sense of shame or secrecy, such as his relationship with Edward Atkinson. Cullen later married Ida Robertson while potentially in a relationship with Atkinson. Letters between Cullen and Atkinson suggest a romantic interest, although there is no concrete evidence that they were in a sexual relationship.

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
